Over the course of two centuries, London changed from the capital of England, secure within its medieval walls, to a metropolitan seat of empire. Its population grew tenfold. Some urban developments were spurred by the dissolution of the monasteries, a royal decree that was both politically and religiously motivated. Also reshaping the city were natural tragedies, like repeated bouts of the plague or the Great Fire of 1666 that destroyed more than 13,000 homes, 86 churches, and over 400 acres in the heart of the city. Such events had a significant impact on the built environment, opening up spaces for repurposing.

*Open City* explores activities and pressures that altered Londoners' sense of community, focusing especially on three types of institutions that touched everyday lives: church, theater, and market. Drawing on materials as disparate as deeds, diaries, engravings, and maps, *Open City* illustrates the impact of new ideas, new products, and new people in this rapidly growing capital city.

## Viking or Mammen Style Embroidery Stitches

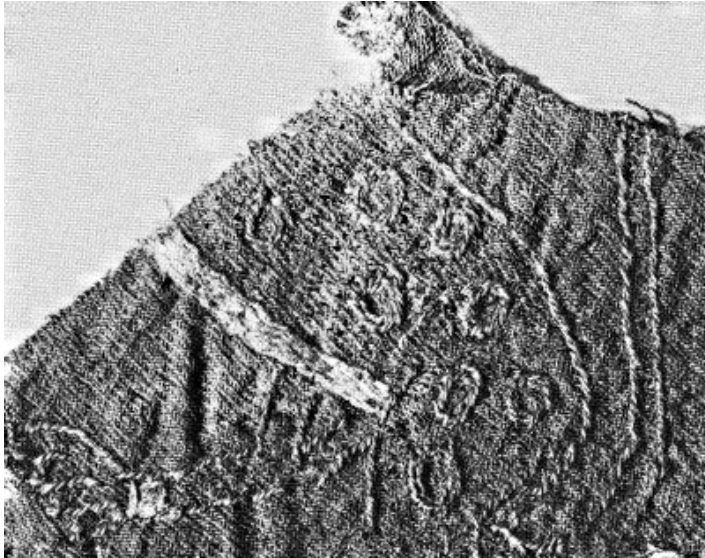

The design on this pouch was inspired by an ornate purse lid discovered at Sutton Hoo. The purse lid is currently on display in the British Museum. While a relatively easy design to execute in stem and chain stitch, it took about 50 hours to complete.

### Early surface decoration of cloth

The concept of adding needlework decoration to clothing can be traced to 1500-500BC - the Early Bronze Age (Staniland, p 4). Some of the earliest examples of embroidery on cloth come from Iraq, Persia and Egypt, can be dated to the early 10th c. The ground was usually linen and chain, back stitch, satin and various types of counted stitch work were done in multi colored silks or cotton (Gervers, p 95-111). To date, one of the most remarkable burial mounds was found in Mammen Parish near Vyborg and has been dated to the close of the 10<sup>th</sup> c or Viking Period. The embroidered textiles from this find are exceptional examples of the earliest embroidery fragments found in Denmark. The designs include acanthus foliage, animals, birds and human masks (Hald p102-111).

While none of the designs are completely intact, Hald suggests they are influenced by manuscripts of the period (p. 104)

A tailor, a weaver, an embroideress, a tablet weaver, a silk weaver, a shoemaker, a designer, a furrier, a dye analyst, a fiber specialist, two archaeologists and a textile conservator spent nearly two years recreating the Viking King Canute's costume which made it's debut at the 4th NESAT Symposium in Copenhagen. (Jorgensen, p 109-110)

Small fragments of embroidery were also in the Oseberg ship burial (see *The Textiles in the Oseberg Ship* by Anne Stine Ingstad at

While costume construction is fun for some for others it's not. Does this mean that if you can't recreate the entire costume you shouldn't use the designs to embellish your clothing? Does this mean you shouldn't use other designs from this period to enhance your clothing or that you are limited by one costume as to placement of the designs on your clothing? I would hope not! Be creative - try a new skill but above all else - Keep it fun! Lucia

## Poetry Corner

*Thrymskvitha*

or

*The Lay of Thrym*

1. Wild was Vingthor | when he awoke,  
And when his mighty | hammer he missed;  
He shook his beard, | his hair was bristling,  
As the son of Jorth | about him sought.
2. Hear now the speech | that first he spake:  
"Harken, Loki, | and heed my words,  
Nowhere on earth | is it known to man,  
Nor in heaven above: | our hammer is stolen."
3. To the dwelling fair | of Freyja went they,  
Hear now the speech | that first he spake:  
"Wilt thou, Freyja, | thy feather-dress lend me,  
That so my hammer | I may seek?"  
*Freyja spake:*
4. "Thine should it be | though of silver bright,  
And I would give it | though 'twere of gold."

Then Loki flew, | and the feather-dress whirred,  
 Till he left behind him | the home of the gods,  
 And reached at last | the realm of the giants.  
 5. Thrym sat on a mound, | the giants' master,  
 Leashes of gold | he laid for his dogs,  
 And stroked and smoothed | the manes of his steeds.

*Thrym spake:*

6. "How fare the gods, | how fare the elves?  
 Why comst thou alone | to the giants' land?"

The *Thrymskvitha* is found only in the *Codex Regius*, where it follows the *Lokasenna*. Snorri does not quote from it, nor, rather oddly, does the story occur in the *Prose Edda*.

Artistically the *Thrymskvitha* is one of the best, as it is, next to the *Voluspo*, the most famous, of the entire collection. It has, indeed, been called "the finest ballad in the world," and not without some reason. Its swift, vigorous action, the sharpness of its characterization and the humor of the central situation combine to make it one of the most vivid short narrative poems ever composed. Of course we know nothing specific of its author, but there can be no question that he was a poet of extraordinary ability. The poem assumed its present form, most critics agree, somewhere about 900, and thus it is one of the oldest in the collection. It has been suggested, on the basis of stylistic similarity, that its author may also have composed the *Skirnismol*, and possibly *Baldrs Draumar*. There is also some resemblance between the *Thrymskvitha* and the *Lokasenna* (note, in this connection, Bugge's suggestion that the *Skirnismol* and the *Lokasenna* may have been by the same man), and it is not impossible that all four poems have a single authorship.

The *Thrymskvitha* has been preserved in excellent condition, without any serious gaps or interpolations. In striking contrast to many of the poems, it contains no prose narrative links, the story being told in narrative verse--a rare phenomenon in the poems of the *Edda*.

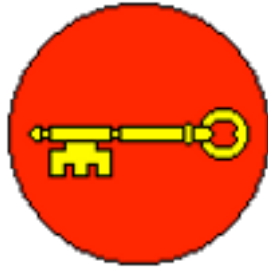
