FOOD FOR THOUGHT

To make a Tart of Cheese

A the Mid-Winter's event I planned the feast and my Cheese Tart was a huge hit so I am sharing the recipe with all to make and enjoy at home



Original Recipes:

To make short paste for a Tart. Take fine Flower, a litle faire water, & a dish of sweete butter, & a little saffron, and the yolkes of two egges, & make it thin and as tender as ye may.

To make a Tart of Cheese. Take harde Chese and cut it in slices, and pare it, then lay it in fayre water, or in sweete mylke, the space of three houres, then take it up, and break it in ma morter till it be small, then draw it up through a strayner, with the yolkes of six egges, and season it up with Suger and sweete butter, and so bake it.

My Interpretation of Recipes:

Tart Pastry 1 cup of Flour Pinch of Salt ¼ tsp. Sugar

6 tbls. Cold Butter Several Threads of Saffron 2 Egg Yolks 2 1/2 tbls. of Ice Water, or as needed

Combine the flour, sugar, and salt in large mixing bowl. Cut the butter into the mixture until it resembles coarse meal. Slowly add 2 1/2 tablespoons of water, mixing until the pastry comes together; add more water if necessary. On a lightly floured surface, shape the pastry into a disk, wrap in plastic and refrigerate until chilled, about 30 minutes. Roll out to fit your pie plate. Pre-bake your shell at 350-degrees until lightly golden in color.

Cheese Tart

12 oz. Hard Cheese (I used Cabot Extra Sharp Cheddar Cheese) 1 cup Heavy Cream

6 Egg Yolks

2 tbsp. Butter, melted

1 tsp. Sugar

Thinly slice all the cheese and place in a large bowl. Pour cream over cheese and let soak for three hours. Place in a food processor or blender, along with egg yolks, butter, and sugar and blend until smooth. Place the mixture into your prepared tart pastry and bake in 350-degree oven for 35-40 minutes until set.

THE LIFE OF THESEUS

Just as geographers, O Sossius Senecio, crowd on to the outer edges of their maps the parts of the earth which elude their knowledge, with explanatory notes that "What lies beyond is sandy desert without water and full of wild beasts," or "blind marsh," or "Scythian cold," or "frozen sea," so in the writing of my Parallel Lives, now that I have traversed those periods of time which are accessible to probable reasoning and which afford basis for a history dealing with facts, I might well say of the earlier periods: "What lies beyond is full of marvels and unreality, a land of poets and fabulists, of doubt and obscurity." But after publishing my account of Lycurgus the lawgiver and Numa the king, I thought I might not unreasonably go back still farther to Romulus, now that my history had brought me near his times. And as I asked myself,

"With such a warrior" (as Aeschylus says) "who will dare to fight?"

"Whom shall I set against him? Who is competent?"

it seemed to me that I must make the founder of lovely and famous Athens the counterpart and parallel to the father of invincible and glorious Rome. May I therefore succeed in purifying Fable, making her submit to reason and take on the semblance of History. But where she obstinately disdains to make herself credible, and refuses to admit any element of probability, I shall pray for kindly readers, and such as receive with indulgence the tales of antiquity.

Since it was still a custom at that time for youth who were coming of age to go to Delphi and sacrifice some of their hair to the god, Theseus went to Delphi for this purpose, and they say there is a place there which still to this day is called the Theseia from him. But he sheared only the fore part of his head, just as Homer said the Abantes did, and this kind of tonsure was called Theseïs after him.

Now the Abantes were the first to cut their hair in this manner, not under instruction from the Arabians, as some suppose, nor yet in emulation of the Mysians, but because they were war-like men and close fighters, who had learned beyond all other men to force their way into close quarters with their enemies. Archilochus is witness to this in the following words:

"Not many bows indeed will be stretched tight, nor frequent slings Be whirled, when Ares joins men in the moil of war Upon the plain, but swords will do their mournful work; For this is the warfare wherein those men are expert

Who lord it over Euboea and are famous with the spear."

Therefore, in order that they might not give their enemies a hold by their hair, they cut it off. And Alexander of Macedon doubtless understood this when, as they say, he ordered his generals to have the beards of their Macedonians shaved, since these afforded the readiest hold in battle.

In Eleusis, moreover, he out-wrestled Cercyon the Arcadian and killed him; and going on a little farther, at Erineüs, he killed Damastes, surnamed Procrustes, by compelling him to make his own body fit his bed, as he had been wont to do with those of strangers. And he did this in imitation of Heracles. For that hero punished those who offered him violence in the manner in which they had plotted to serve him, and therefore sacrificed Busiris, wrestled Antaeus to death, slew Cycnus in single combat, and killed Termerus by dashing in his skull. It is from him, indeed, as they say, that the name "Termerian mischief" comes, for Termerus, as it would seem, used to kill those who encountered him by dashing his head against theirs. Thus Theseus also went on his way chastising the wicked, who were visited with the same violence from him which they were visiting upon others, and suffered justice after the manner of their own injustice.

This month my Poetry corner is actually not poetry. Instead I will share some of the work of Plutarch from "The Rise and Fall of Athens"

Plutarch was a first century Greek writer and philosopher from Thebes. He came from Chaeronea, in the Boeotian plain. He studied philosophy in Athens, traveled in Greece and Egypt and as a diplomat in Rome. He also served as a magistrate in his hometown and in the priesthood in Delphi. His value to our study of the medieval period is that he was widely read by educated people in the period. There are many translations from the period, in Latin, German, Italian and more. And so, for your enjoyment a brief excerpt from Plutarch, which I hope will interest you and lead to exploring his work more widely. The classics that survived continue to influence the modern world, for we still tell tales of the men and women whose stories start with ancient writers.

HISTORY HIGHLIGHTS

THE DOME OF THE HAGIA SOPHIA COLLAPSES

Justinian I immediately orders the dome rebuilt, 558

Disaster struck the Hagia Sophia when she was destroyed in 532 during the Nika Riots. In the evening and early morning of 14-15 January a fire swept throughout the Augousteion. The inferno reached the church and engulfed the entire building bringing it crashing down.

The destruction of Constantinople caused by the riots of 532 gave Justinian I an opportunity to impose the new iconography onto the city and its people using a new and more magnificent Hagia Sophia. He chose a new revolutionary design suggested by Anthemius of Tralles and Isidore of Miletus. It took five years and ten months to complete and it was dedicated on 26 December 537.

Anthemius and Isidore were not architects by trade. They were referred to as mechanikoi, which translates closer to engineer, though that term is inaccurate as well. "The ancients describe [mechanikoi] as 'wonderworkers."" Both were employed as mathematicians, teaching geometry in Antioch when summoned by Justinian I. Both were accomplished men in their field, each having been published on their mathematical theories

One of the goals of erecting the new church was to expand the space of the earlier Theodosian version while keeping the same sight lines to maximize the number of congregants so they could see the emperor at prayer. The best geometric shape that places the most area at the shortest distance from one single point is the circle. The only problem with using a circle was its association to the pagan traditions. In order to accomplish this they choose to square off the nave at the end opposite the entrance and add two semicircular areas to each side. This is called a hemicycle.

The rebuilding of the church had many challenges, one being how to accomplish construction of the second floor. Building materials had to be lifted some forty feet using primitive cranes in conjunction with vertical guy ropes holding their masts. These were also used to lift heavy objects.

In 535 construction had come to a point that would test the strength of the piers and columns by constructing the arches and vaults that housed the nave. The problem was that it was being constructed so rapidly that the slow-setting mortar had not had time to fully dry before construction began of the arches and vaults. In order to correct this, Isidore and Anthemius came up with a geometric solution that changed the shape of the buttressing arches from a semicircle to a parabola. This change "altered the force of the arch to a more vertical direction (reducing the angular stress on the piers). Just to be safe, they also added stone

projections at the gallery level and above, which strengthened the piers in the same way adding rungs stiffens a ladder." As 536 began problems continued, this time with the marble columns that were supporting the north and south arches. The marble columns had begun to chip showing that they were under stress. It is thought that the bronze decorative collars were placed on the tops and bottoms of the columns along the ground level to solve this particular problem.

Anthemius and Isidore wanted to accomplish more than just placing a roof over the rock and marble. They had to find a way to illuminate the interior and the way they accomplished this was to construct a dome that was placed over the church while allowing large

amounts of natural light. They used the pendentive to support this enormous dome.

The massive dome was about 105 feet across and over 180 feet tall and would have stood taller than the columns of Theodosius, Arcadius, and Constantine. The inside of the church was even more impressive by its colossal size and space. The roof was so high that the mosaic of Christ within the dome looked to the person on the ground as a normal sized human being yet it was so large that the length between the eyes was actually three human palms. The space below the dome was so vast that the dome almost appeared to be floating above in thin air. The dome was framed by beautiful mosaics and columns carved from red, purple, and green marble that in turn supported the galleries. The area was illuminated by the forty small windows around the base of the dome. The sunlight would come in through the windows from different angles depending on the time of day and shine on the gold mosaics and marble columns filling the room with amazing light.

Sofia was a master piece that brought math and beauty together into one finished product. During the day light poured through the lunettes and windows that drew the sun in transversely into the nave. At night light was reflected from thousands of lamp candelabras off of the chains suspended from the dome that formed a metal circle hung from silver disks. Now the architects could report to the emperor that the church was indeed finished.

Some twenty years later disaster struck the cathedral again, this time an earthquake. During the earthquake one of the four arches that had held up the awesome dome had been damaged. Not six months later the entire dome fell. Anthemius had long since been dead so Isidore the younger, a nephew of Isidore of Miletus, had been summoned to repair the damage. He added strength to the dome by making it narrower and a bit higher than before. He also added buttressing to the outside of the church to enhance the support of the dome.
