













# Food For Thought

### The Feast of the Four Humors By Lady Katla Flókadóttir

In 2018 I was asked to do my first feast for Night on the Rhine. I had so much fun researching recipes and figuring out how to make them be historically accurate and taste delicious to boot. I called it the Feast of the Four Humors: Melancholic, Sanguine, Phlegmatic, and Macrocosm. I worked the feast around the writings of Hildegard

von Bingen.

Hildegard von Bingen (1098-1179) was a Benedictine Abbess in 12th century Germany who lived along the Rhine valley. She founded two convents, one at Rupertsberg and the other at Eibingen. She was a woman ahead of her time and wrote several books. Not only was she a writer but also a composer, philosopher, Christian mystic, visionary, and polymath. She was known throughout the land as a healer and would was consulted by kings, queens, popes, and the common people alike for cures and advice on what ailed them.

In order to keep our four humors in harmony one must eat in accordance with certain rules in mind. According to Hildegard in order to keep our humors in order we must keep a balance of hot and cold, as well as dry and moist when considering what we eat. Hildegard's key to a good and healthy life was moderation, good advice indeed. The feast I prepared contained some of that advice, so I hope you not only enjoy the selection of recipes, but her advice as well.

Humorism or humoralism was a system of Hippocratic medicine taught and used from circa 300 BCE through the beginning of modern medicine in the 19th century.

The four humors are melancholic - fire (hot and dry) - Yellow Bile, sanguine - water (cold and wet) - phlegm, phlegmatic - earth (cold and dry) - black bile, macrocosm - air (hot and wet) - blood.

Pea Soup - Erbeßsuppen – 8 servings

1 lb. split peas 1 qt. water

1 small onion, minced

½ tsp. ground black pepper

2 tsp. olive oil

1 qt. vegetable broth

2 tsp. salt

Saute onion in bottom of stock pot with oil until translucent on med-high heat. Add broth, water, salt, and peas. Bring to boil. Lower heat to low and simmer for two hours until peas are soft. If too thick for your taste you may want to add more vegetable stock or water. Then serve.

Peas are cold and somewhat phlegmatic. They can oppress your lungs a bit but they are good for the warm-natured person and can make them bold! But, if you are a coldnatured person it would be wise to avoid peas because they produce much mucus.

The onion does not have proper heat but instead has sharp moisture. Do not worry they will not be served raw, because as you may not already know they can be harmful and poisonous.

The oil of the olive is not good for eating because it provokes nausea and makes some foods troublesome to eat. Lucky for us when combined with the other ingredients it should render its powers void.

Pepper is very hot and dry. Do not eat too much of this spice because it can be harmful in large doses. It causes pleurisy, destroys your humors, and creates bad ones.

Always remember moderation!

Salt is very hot and a bit moist. Make sure you have enough salt in your diet in order to keep your insides tepid. Used in moderation in your foods it will keep you strong and healthy. Just be careful not to eat too much because you can dry yourself out internally.

Pickled Onions and Cucumbers-Eingelegte Zwiebeln und Gurken

6 c. thinly sliced pickling cucumbers (about 2 pounds)

2 c. thinly sliced onion 1 ½ c. white wine vinegar

3/4 c. sugar 3/4 tsp. salt

½ tsp. mustard seeds

½ tsp. celery seeds

1/2 tsp. ground turmeric 1/2 tsp. crushed red pepper

<sup>1</sup>/<sub>4</sub> tsp. ground black pepper 4 garlic cloves, thinly sliced

Place three cups cucumber in a medium glass bowl; top with 1 cup onion. Repeat procedure with the remaining three cups cucumber and remaining one cup onion. Combine vinegar and remaining ingredients in a small saucepan; stir well. Bring to a boil; cook one minute. Pour over cucumber mixture; let cool. Cover and chill at least four days.

Chicken Pie

3 lb. whole chicken, cut up ½ tsp. ground black pepper

1 small onion, peeled, cut in half

2 quarts water

3 Tbs. chicken base

½ tsp. cumin

2 oz. bacon, cooked & crumbled

1 tsp. salt 1 pie crust

6 eggs

Bring water mixed with chicken base to a boil. Add chicken and onion and continue to boil for 30 minutes. Remove chicken and allow to cool. Meanwhile, cook and crumble bacon. Place prepared pie crust into pie pan, poking some holes in the bottom with a fork, and pre-cook for 15 minutes at 425°F. Shred chicken removing bones and skin. Beat eggs and mix the spices into the beaten eggs. Then mix the chicken, bacon, and egg mixture together. Place into the pie pan. Bake the pie at 425°F for 15 minutes. Then reduce the oven temperature to 300°F. Bake for another 30 minutes.

The hen has both a cold and dry nature and their flesh is good for us to eat as long as we are in good health. If you are sick be weary of eating chicken for it will make mucus in your stomach, thus making it weak and unable to digest

any food you eat.

Cumin is dry and of moderate heat. No matter how you eat this herb it is good for you as long as you do not have pain in your heart or have a lung ailment. As long as you are in good health it will furnish a good disposition and moderates your temperature when

you are too hot.

Eggs are more cold than hot. Be warned that they are not good to eat and are almost like poison. It is a good thing that the recipe in question is using domesticated hens. You should still be leery of these eggs, but eaten in moderation you should be safe. They are harmful to weakened intestines

# Composer's Conner

Medieval Music – Part II Early Chant Notation By Mistress Arianna Morgan, OP

There isn't a single reference which documents the creation of the earliest medieval notation. Early medieval notation did not indicate precise pitches. Symbols known as neumes served as reminders to singers of the direction of the melody which they had

already learned by rote.

Although it sounds very primitive compared to modern musical notation, early medieval music notation contained a wealth of information about a chant for singers who had studied chant and learned the melodies aurally. In addition to serving as a memory aid, the notation also provided information about the relative rise and fall of the melody, placement of pitches in relation to the text, articulation, groups, melodic gestures and phrasing, pitch inflection, voice production, and even

In neumatic notation, the signs indcating single notes and groups of notes are set to the words of sacred texts which were sung during religious celebrations. Most liturgical texts were probably associated with corresponding melodies in the minds of medieval clergy, cantors, and choir members. Scholars believe this may explain why many books containing chant do not have any traces of music notation. An analogy can be made with modern popular tunes such as Happy Birthday, or Twinkle Twinkle Little Star. Most

people learned these tunes without ever having seen the music notation.

The basic unit of music writing was the syllable. This is evidenced by the fact that the notation, either a single symbol/neumes or several symbols/neumes grouped over a syllable are clearly separated from the signs placed over the previous and following

syllable.\*

The earliest examples of neumatic notation appear in treatises from the early 9th century and are a series of dots and dashes added to the text. These early symbols are believed to have been derived from the Acute (') the Grave (') and the Circumflex (^) used by Carolingian writers, grammarians, and readers to indicate direction, accent, and change of inflection.

In music, the Acute accent known as the virga, an upward slash (/) indicated a higher pitch in relation to the previous or following tone. The Grave accent, a downward slash (\) indicated a lower pitch in relation to the previous or following tone. Early on, the downward slash was shortened to something that looked like a dot (.) or a dash (-). These were later known as the punctum and the tractulus. The circumflex sign

(^) represented a rising and falling of pitch. This figure was replaced by compound figures which included the combination of a virga and punctum (/-). Scholars believe that when these early signs were placed above a text to indicate a melody, they helped singers recall certain melodic formulas already associated with a particular text. However, as previously stated, the use of the notation still required that the melody be learned aurally beforehand.

Rice from Greece - Ris von Kriechen

1 c. rice

1 Tbs. olive oil

2 c. water

Salt to taste

Combine rice, water, and olive oil and place on high heat. Once at a full boil cover pot and reduce heat to low. Cook for 20 minutes and do not remove the lid. Do not over salt.

All food should be salted in order to bring out their flavors, just remember the previous warnings about consuming too much.

Roasted Root Vegetables

3 lbs. assorted root vegetables

2 Tbsp. olive oil

1 tsp. sugar

Preheat oven to 375 degrees. Peel and chop root vegetables into bite sized pieces. Coat vegetables in olive oil. Place in roasting dish and cook for 40-50 minutes until they are tender. Every 10 minutes stir the vegetables. Place in serving bowl and sprinkle with sugar.

Sugar will refresh one who eats or drinks it. If you are sick in the head or chest and coughing or congested, sugar is what you need. It will purge your brain and loosen up your chest.

 $\overline{2}$  ½ to 3 lbs. cabbage 2 c. white wine vinegar

4 Tbsp. mustard

2 tsp. caraway seeds

2 Tbsp. honey

1 tsp. anise seeds

Shred the cabbage and cook in a pot (it will cook with its own moisture). Strain the cabbage. Mix cabbage and all other ingredients together except white wine vinegar. Put the cabbage in a bowl and add

the white wine vinegar and combine. Serve cold.

Cabbage is of a moist nature. Their juices are a bit injurious and create great maladies in your body and creates weak intestines. If you are healthy you should not have to worry too much about its effects on the body. But be warned, they can increase bad humors.

White Mush (Bread Pudding) -Hwit Moos

2 c. milk

2 eggs (slightly beaten)

1 tsp ground cinnamon (rounded) ½ c. sugar

<sup>1</sup>⁄<sub>4</sub> c. butter

1 baguette, sliced

½ tsp. salt

Take milk and butter and put into a sauce pan. Cook on medium heat until butter has melted and take off of heat. Take beaten eggs and add the sugar, cinnamon, and salt, mix well. Cube the bread slices. Fold the bread cubes into the egg and spice mixture. Place in a greased casserole dish. Bake at 350 for 45 minutes.

Cinnamon is very hot and powerful. It reduces bad humors if eaten often. It is great to treat gout and various fevers.
